SEATTLE, WA (October 3, 2024) — ACT Contemporary Theatre has announced the cast and creative teams for the second annual New Works Northwest Festival (NW2 Festival), presented October 30 through November 3, 2024 in ACT's Bullitt Theatre. Featuring 20 new works over the 5 day event, ACT Contemporary Theatre continues as the epicenter of groundbreaking new work that promises to captivate, challenge, and inspire. Performed as readings in an intimate setting, audiences will get the chance to witness the workshop process of bringing stories from script to stage. Two plays initially performed at the 2023 festival went on to join ACT's 2024/25 Season: Andrew Lee Creech's <u>Golden</u> and the upcoming <u>Mrs. Loman is Leaving</u> written by Katie Forgette.

ACT's 2024 New Works Northwest Festival features readings of new plays by local playwrights Holly Arsenault, Amontaine Aurore, Yussef El Guindi, Gloria Majule, and Naghmeh Samini. Each reading will be followed by a conversation with the playwright and audience, moderated by ACT Artistic Associate Shana Bestock. In a new addition to the festival, ACT is partnering with local organizations **SCRiBLAB** and **Rain City Projects** to present **Solo ACT**, an evening of original monologues all based on the theme "The Choice." Solo ACT kicks off the festivities on Wednesday, October 30.

ABOUT YUSSEF EL GUINDI (PLAYWRIGHT)

Born in Egypt, raised in London and now based in Seattle, Yussef El Guindi's work frequently examines the collision of ethnicities, cultures, and politics that face Middle Eastern and Muslim Americans. His *Hotter Than Egypt* was staged at ACT (World Premiere), Marin Theatre Company, and the Denver Center for the Performing Arts. A previous ACT World Premiere, *People of the Book*, will be staged this Fall in NYC at Urban Stages, directed by former ACT Artistic DirectorJohn Langs. He is the recipient of several honors, including the Steinberg/ATCA New Play Award, American Blues Theater's Blue Ink Playwriting Award, L.A. Weekly's Excellence in Playwriting Award, Seattle's Gregory Award, and the Middle East America Distinguished Playwright Award. In 2023, he was selected to be a Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature in the U.K.

Mshale, a Mount Kilimanjaro tour guide, dreams of marrying a white woman and moving to the West. Sprite doesn't like white people and sets out to decolonize what he deems "his mountain." Henry and Frannie are white missionaries who claim to be Tanzanian. *Uhuru* is a dramedy that follows this unlikely foursome as they journey together to the roof of Africa.

ABOUT GLORIA MAJULE (PLAYWRIGHT)

Gloria Majule is a storyteller born and raised in Dodoma, Tanzania. She seeks to tell stories that bring multiple black voices together from across the world, and are accessible to black audiences no matter where they are. Gloria has been commissioned by Audible and Atlantic Theater Company. Her work has been supported by Vassar's Powerhouse Theater, The New Harmony Project, The New Group, and Great Plains Theater Commons among others. Her canon includes *Culture Shock* (Winner: Leah Ryan Prize, Finalist: O'Neill, Alliance/Kendeda, BAPF), *Uhuru* (Finalist: Blue Ink Award, Premiere Stages, BAPF), *My Father was Shot in the Back of the Head* (Finalist: O'Neill, Seven Devils, Orchard Project), and *Fifteen Hundred* (Finalist: Seven Devils). She holds a BA in Performing & Media Arts and Spanish from Cornell University, and was the first African woman to receive an MFA in Playwriting from Yale School of Drama.

ABOUT AMONTAINE AURORE (PLAYWRIGHT)

Amontaine Aurore is a storyteller, playwright, actor, director, producer, and performance artist. She is committed to presenting stories that illuminate multiple perspectives and explore human complexity. Her solo play, *Free Desiree*, was named as one of the Best New Plays of the New York Fringe Festival by Indie Theater Now. *Don't Call it a Riot*, her play about Seattle activism, was a finalist in the Bay Area Playwright's Festival and premiered in Seattle in 2018. Amontaine has received artist grants from Artist Trust, 4Culture, the Puffin Foundation, and the Seattle Office of Arts and Culture. She's been a writer-in-residence at Hedgebrook Writers' Retreat and the Seattle Public Library. Amontaine is a 2024 Jack Straw Writing Fellow, and is currently working on an autobiographical novel.

ABOUT HOLLY ARSENAULT (PLAYWRIGHT)

Holly Arsenault writes plays. Some are funny with sad parts, while others are sad with funny parts. Her plays, which often talk about families (chosen, circumstantial, and biological), have been produced in Seattle, Florida, Chicago, and Detroit. She is the recipient of the 2013 Theatre Puget Sound Gregory Award for her play, *UNDO* and her play *Court* was selected for the National Women's Playwriting Festival in 2019. She has been nominated for a Princess Grace

Award and the American Theatre Critics Association Osborne Award, and was a finalist for Heideman Award at the National 10-Minute Play Contest at Actors' Theatre of Louisville. Holly is an alum of the Seattle Rep Writers Group and a proud member of the Dramatists Guild of America. She lives in Edinburgh, Scotland with her family.

Home By Naghmeh Samini Directed by Parmida Ziaei Translators: Hossein Nazari & Ghazal Ghaziani Co-presented with Seda Iranian Theatre Ensemble Sunday, November 3 at 7:00pm <u>Tickets >></u>

Trapped in a shrinking house, an Iranian family of five lives in isolation, locked in separate rooms, revealing their loneliness, regrets, and their lack of communication only to the audience. *Home* offers a glimpse of what goes on inside an Iranian household, telling familiar stories of the fragility of the human psyche and the vulnerability of a family in a world that is breaking down.

ABOUT NAGHMEH SAMINI (PLAYWRIGHT)

Naghmeh Samini is an award-wining playwright from Iran. Samini received her BA in Drama and MA in Cinema both from the University of Tehran and holds a PhD in Drama and Mythology. She has been a professor at the University of Tehran since 2005 and an affiliate Professor of UW since 2019. More than twenty of her plays have been staged in over 3 countries, and she has published over 30 plays and articles. Some of her awards and achievements include: Best Book of the Year in Iran for *Myth's Theatre/ An Archetypical Approach to Iranian Dramatic Literature* in 2009, Winner of the Best Playwright in the Second Playwright's Forum Festival in 2008, Winner of the Best Dramatic Adaptation in 2023. Her recent play, *The Forgotten History of Mastaneh*, directed by herself and produced by Seda Theatre which she is a co-founder of, was acclaimed by Seattle audiences.
